1. Presentations (6:00 p.m. - 6:10 p.m.)

The hearing began at 6:00 p.m.

Assistant City Administrator Jim Chandler explained the process and considerations given to petitions submitted to the City for the implementation of a Residential Parking Zone.

City of Hyattsville Parking Compliance Supervisor Gary Bullis presented the findings of the traffic study and the possible actions the City could take.

2. Public Comment (6:10 p.m. – 6:30 p.m.) Complete Speaker Card, Limit 2 minutes per speaker

Christine Taylor spoke in favor of the petition and noted her experience not being able to find parking. She added that a lot of the people she sees parking walk to the nearby apartment building. She expressed her frustration that people will not move their car when asked to, and that she sees individuals dump trash on the street and then walk to the apartment buildings.

James Brodie expressed his frustration with the lack of enforcement of resident parking in his area.

Councilmember Waszczak asked if the City has received feedback from Metro, PGCPs, homeowners, apartment residents/management, or the local daycare about the current parking situation.

Mr. Chandler replied that this was the first opportunity to receive feedback and that the City expects to get more input from stakeholders over the next thirty days.

Caroline Patrick spoke in favor of the petition and noted her difficulty finding parking when she comes home late at night. She added that the residents of the apartments are parking on the street.

Mr. Chandler outlined the next steps in the process and closed the hearing.
